

## Some Notes of Interest

- Minis require less feed than a full-sized horse since they weigh 200-400 lbs. instead of 1000-1500 lbs.
- They need less space, but they still need room to run and BE A HORSE!
- They still require the same hoof, dental, and veterinarian care as a full-sized horse.
- Their purchase price is similar to that of a full-sized horse, ranging from several hundred to several thousand dollars.

## What is a Miniature Horse?

A miniature horse is a breed determined by height: less than 34" for AMHA; or 38" for AMHR. The measurement is from the last hair of the mane in a vertical line to the ground.

## What Can You Do With A Miniature Horse?

Although miniature horses are not usually ridden, except by very small children, they can be driven and are surprisingly strong!



Another popular activity is to show your horse at both pointed shows and fun shows.



KMHC sponsors fun shows in Spring, Summer and Fall which offers a relaxed atmosphere to socialize and compete with our horses, while learning how to properly exhibit in preparation for future pointed shows.

Show classes include: showmanship, halter, driving, obstacle, and fun classes as well.
